Located in the Lanet section of Nakuru, Kenya, <u>The Child Discovery Center</u> serves poor children in the area. The funds raised by <u>Central Catholic's</u>

<u>Lasallian Ministry</u> will support renovations to building structures, help with the food budget, and assist in building an underground water tank, which can hold water for about five months. Of the 50 children currently being served by the center,

35 currently live there.

The Fratelli Project, an initiative born from the combined commitment of the De La Salle and Marist Brothers after news of the political and social realities of the Middle East, aims to directly help victims of war. This co-congregational effort serves underprivileged and vulnerable youth and the refugees displaced from their countries due to war and violence.

The funds, raised through daily collections and friendly competitions between homerooms, will be evenly split between the two charities.

Students Repair Homes, Spread Kindness During Annual Appalachian Mission Trip

The mission of Central Catholic, to form our students into young men of faith, scholarship and service, is not suspended for the summer. There are many Lasallian Ministry programs and events throughout the summer in which our students can further their formation to become the faith-filled servant leaders of tomorrow. An example of this was the third annual Appalachian service trip.

At the end of June, Campus Ministry took 40 Central Catholic students and 40 Oakland Catholic students to Webster Springs, W.Va., for one week. The community of students, teachers, and parents repaired homes, built retaining walls and explored the backroads of rural West Virginia.

More importantly, all participants were pushed to go beyond surface level acts of service. The pastor of the

Methodist church where the group stayed welcomed everyone at the beginning of the week and said:

"You're going out to work on homes but really you're going out to work on hearts."

With that sentiment setting the tone for the week, the group not only repaired homes but also interacted with the homeowners and learned their stories. It is easy to build a retaining wall but it is more meaningful to build a bridge between two people of vastly different backgrounds, stories, and stations in life. The group strove to better understand the people of Webster Springs and their stories of how

they got to where they are. Many of the participants struggled with the stories they heard from the homeowners – stories of poverty, unemployment, death, and loneliness. But equally, students were often left in awe of the faith that the homeowners have – faith that things will be better, that God is with them, and faith in the goodness of others.

In the end, the group began to understand that while building a wheelchair ramp or repairing a roof are good things, the acts are not what really matters. What matters is that each person remain open to a sense of true compassion and a mentality of service.



Students Reflect at Kairos Retreat


Students Impress AIU with STEM Smarts

Teams of students from across the Commonwealth were challenged to research, present and design a device/project that is capable of making the quality of life better for citizens of Pennsylvania.

It's Easy Being Green

The Sustainable Pittsburgh's Green Workplace Challenge Oversight Committee chose Central Catholic High School as the winner of the 2016-2017 Green Workplace Challenge for K-12 Schools. During the challenge, students in Cassie Sirockman-Bell's Environmental Science classes, along with the

Environmental Science Club, worked feverishly to complete challenges focusing on air quality, water, energy, empathy, transportation and materials management. Central Catholic scored the highest in school engagement and empathy.





Twenty Brother David S. Baginski, FSC, Scholars and chaperones spent ten days of their summer researching art and religion in Rome, Italy, as part of a mini-course entitled *Art and Religions of Rome*, offered by the *Baginski Scholars program*. The course, taught by Baginski Scholars Program Directors Mr. John Allen and Dr. Patrizia Costa-Frezza, offered a series of classes held at Central Catholic before the group embarked on their trip abroad.

"Cultural study trips have been an integral part of our program since its inception," said Patrizia Costa-Frezza, Baginski Scholars Program Director. "This is our first international trip, marking the beginning, we hope, of an expanded tradition. We chose Rome because of its magnificent historical heritage and vibrancy as a modern capital. What a joy it was for the boys to walk on the ancient roads they had read about and immerse themselves in contemporary Italian culture."

From June 18 to 28, students visited iconic landmarks, including the Colosseum, St. Peter's Basilica, the statue of David and the Pantheon, among others. The students and chaperones spent an entire day at the Vatican, where they received the Pope's blessing and listened to his inspiring homily about trusting the community of saints and modeling our everyday lives through their example.

I feel as though the boys' time at Central prepared them well for this trip abroad, said John Allen, Baginski Scholars Program Director. "Among the many highlights of the journey, seeing Brunelleschi's Duomo in Florence held a special place in the imaginative minds of the students because they had already studied it at great length in their European history classes. It is always such a joy to see young men engaged with history, culture, and the process of discovery."

In addition to spending time in Rome, the group ventured to different regions in Italy, including Florence, Pompeii, Orvieto, Assisi and Ostia Antica, where students were able to take in the sights, sounds and tastes of Italian culture from across the region.

"While in Rome, we went beyond 'doing as the Romans do,'" said Anthony DiBello, '18. "My cousins (who are residents of Rome) were surprised to hear that we had toured Cinecittà, because it was something



which they had never done before. Before my freshman year, my father told me that going to Central would offer opportunities which I wouldn't be able to find at other schools. I believe that a study abroad trip to Rome certainly qualifies as one of those opportunities. *Grazie mille!*"

The experience was completely intertwined with the teachings of John Baptist de La Salle. Students resided at Casa La Salle, belonging to the congregation founded by St. John Baptist de La Salle, which is located a short distance from Vatican City. While at Casa La Salle, Colin Aikins, '18, and Tyler Zeik, '18, performed a private concert for former Central Catholic Principal, Br. Bob Schaefer, who now resides at the Brothers' community in Rome, as well as attendees of the International Brothers Conference, which was happening at the same time as the Baginski Scholars' trip to Italy.

In lieu of traditional writing assignments, the students used technology to collect their reflections and experiences in real time through a travel.blog.

Middle Schoolers Explore STEM Fields During First-Ever



Fifty-five middle schoolers from across the region attended Central Catholic's first-ever BAM! (Because Academics Matter) Summer Enrichment Program, held June 19 – 30.

The BAM! curriculum was centered on improving mathematics and writing skills while giving students the opportunity to explore interests in STEM fields in an engaging, hands-on way. Students also had the opportunity to explore their interests with elective classes, including robotics, forensics, engineering and 3D design and printing.

Morning classes were led by Central Catholic faculty with a variety of different backgrounds, including Biology and Environmental Science teacher Mrs. Cassie Sirockman-Bell, as well as current student volunteers. Afternoon add-on programs provided opportunities for students to explore a range of athletic and academic interests, including, crew, robotics, and science.

"BAM! immersed students into the culture of Central Catholic, while exposing them to the academics, teachers and advanced equipment available to students in the new Zupancic Family STEM Center," said Sirockman-Bell. "In addition, the students were guided by current student camp counselors who gave them direction in the classroom and during free time. Watching those current students interact with the middle schoolers showed evidence

of the sense of faith, scholarship and service that a Central Catholic student learns."

In addition to Central Catholic's faculty and student volunteers, students received interactive learning opportunities from professional guest speakers, including Steven Reinstadtler, Market Manager - Construction Coatings at Covestro, LLC., who assisted with Chemistry teacher Mrs. Maddie Ranade's afternoon add-on programs. The two programs, titled Magical Molecules and Funky Science, explored chemistry concepts such as ionic reactions, introductions to the periodic table, chromatography, crystallization, and bubble-ology.









"The students were very engaged with the hands-on experiment that demonstrated the concepts of exothermic and endothermic reactions," said Reinstadtler. "It was great to see them running around the room like a...well...molecule when we conducted the color chromatography experiment. It was personally rewarding to engage these students on both days in such an awesome building dedicated specifically to STEM learning – a topic that is very important to me."

Recently opened in August 2016, the Zupancic Family STEM Center provided a welcoming environment for students to explore STEM topics. Students had the opportunity to use the state-of-the-art lab equipment, as well as experiment with 3D printers and Lego NXT Robots.

"The BAM! camp was a huge success,"

said Mr. Adam Kronebusch, Mathematics Department Chair. "Our teachers and high school counselors did a great job of creating a fun environment while engaging the campers in mathematics, writing, science, and more. I'm excited to see the program grow over the coming years and show off how great our school is to younger students."






"It's been another tremendous year for our student athletes and we look forward to additional successes in the 2017-2018 academic year,"



With over \$27 million in funds raised thanks to generous donors, Central Catholic is providing a world-class education in state-of-the-art facilities and inspiring the young men who enter our doors to become Men of Faith, Scholarship and Service.

Supporting Lasallian Principles

Ensuring affordability for students is vital to Central Catholic's mission. As a result of the Campaign, Central Catholic added \$14 million to the existing endowment fund, far exceeding the initial goal of \$10 million.

In the 2016-2017 school year, Central distributed nearly \$1.7 million in tuition assistance, benefiting 36% of the student body. The growth of





Building Towards the Future

In addition to the Zupancic Family STEM Center and Staley Family Plaza, the Campaign has allowed for upgrades to the main building to improve the quality of education for students.

Formerly the faculty rooms and office space, the second floor is now home to the counseling center, made possible through a generous donation by John R. McGinley, Jr., '61, which is specifically designed to meet the needs of students in a rapidly changing world. A dedicated college resource area within the counseling

center will make it easier for college representatives to meet with students on campus.

Lasallian Ministry has also moved from the fourth floor to a newly updated space on the second floor. For the first time in Central Catholic's history, Central has an oratory in the main building, which provides a designated prayer space for students, faculty and staff. The addition of the oratory and new Lasallian Ministry space was made possible through a generous donation from the Donahue family.

The first new building to be built on Central Catholic's campus since Alumni Hall in 1978, the Zupancic Family STEM Center was dedicated by Bishop David A. Zubik on Sept. 11, 2016, the same day that the main building was dedicated by Bishop Hugh C. Boyle in 1927.

The Zupancic Family STEM Center is a 30,000 square-foot state-of-the-art facility that boasts 12 brand new, fully equipped classrooms, including dedicated computer science, robotics, science and engineering labs that encourage collaborative group work. The space also boasts a tech shop where students get hands-on experience with technical equipment, including 3D printers, a laser cutter, a CNC mill, welders and a plasma cutter.


"The spaces and resources provided to us through our generous alumni are first-class and compete with offerings at the collegiate level," said Adam Kronebusch, Mathematics Department Chair. "Our tech shop and build spaces provide students with the unique experience of being able to prototype any design they can think up. Central Catholic students are learning skills and gaining experiences that prepare them to think like engineers and scientists as they apply the knowledge from all of their courses into their designs."



After the traditional school day is complete, the Zupancic Family STEM Center provides the opportunity for students to explore interests in robotics and engineering outside of the classroom. The robotics team, led by Mr. John Napovanic and Mr. David Bodrog, competes on a national level, and most recently took home the Creativity in Engineering Award for their vision tracking system at the Smoky Mountain Regional Competition in Knoxville, Tenn.

The Staley Family Plaza provides a welcoming gathering place outside of the Zupancic Family Stem Center. In the center of the plaza, a statue of St. John Baptist de La Salle, which was hand-crafted in Italy, serves as a prominent reminder of our Lasallian mission.

With nearly 75% of Central's alumni remaining in the Pittsburgh area after graduation, Central Catholic hopes to instill a level of STEM fluency, combined with a strong Catholic, liberal arts education, into the area's workforce and ensure a bright and prosperous future for the local community.

Faculty Spotlight: Justin Belardi, Ph.D.

After earning his Ph.D. in Organic Chemistry at Yale University, Justin Belardi, Ph.D., spent several years in the corporate chemistry world at innovative corporations like Merck and Knopp Biosciences prior to joining the Central Catholic faculty in the beginning of the 2016-2017 school year.



It wasn't until Justin walked through the brand new Zupancic Family STEM Center and Staley Family Plaza that he knew that Central would be the right place for him to begin his teaching career.

Read what Justin had to say about working in the new Zupancic Family STEM Center and why he chose Central Catholic:

. { Tell us a little bit about your background.

A. I received my undergraduate degree in chemistry from Villanova University and my Ph.D. in organic chemistry from Yale University. After that I worked at Merck for three years doing drug discovery on a variety of projects including migraine and HIV. I then wanted to move back to the Pittsburgh area so I went to Knopp Biosciences located on the Southside of Pittsburgh where I worked on a drug discovery project for epilepsy. I also supported our clinical trials in ALS and hypereosinophilic syndrome by managing our drug manufacturing and quality.

It wasn't until last year that I switched careers to teaching here at Central Catholic where I now teach AP Chemistry, Honors Chemistry, and new next year will be Honors Organic Chemistry. I will also be taking over the lead on the Environmental Club next year. I look forward to working with the students outside of the classroom setting to hopefully make positive impacts for our school and community.

Q. \ How did the teaching environment at Central Catholic impact your decision to come to Central?

A. I really enjoyed my job at Knopp and so I avoided making the career switch into teaching for a couple years. It wasn't until Br. Tony walked me through the STEM building and talked to me about the Lasallian philosophy of education that I knew there wasn't going to be a better place for me to make the career change.

Q. \ How have your students benefited from the updated technology available in the Zupancic Family STEM Center?

A. We have a large and beautiful classroom that is perfect for quick transitions to hands-on laboratory activities which is really important in a chemistry class. We can start a class by learning about a new topic in a traditional classroom environment and then immediately switch to a lab setting so that students can apply their knowledge on that topic. Also, having this space is allowing us to offer new electives like the organic chemistry course that I will be teaching which will provide our students with college prep opportunities that are not common at most high schools.

Q. \ What is your favorite thing about working at Central Catholic?

A. Easily the students. These young men are a pleasure to work with every day. We have such a wonderful culture here where the students themselves create a fun and energetic learning environment. It makes it easy for me to come to work and there isn't a day that passes where I don't learn something new from them.

Q. \langle How would you describe the rest of the faculty at Central?

A. Remarkably impressive. The faculty here care so much about the students and the school culture. The Brothers set the pace with their lifelong dedication to education and the rest of the faculty works so hard to create a positive experience for the students that extends far beyond the classroom.

Q. \ Why do you think introduction to STEM education in high school is important?

A. There is definitely a trend of high quality jobs shifting toward the STEM industries, but as much as anything I think it is important that we as a community are educating all of our students with the ability to solve problems, interpret data, and draw conclusions. By having STEM education as a key part of a broader curriculum we are giving our students plenty of opportunities to learn these skills.

Q. \ What's the most important thing that you hope students gain from your classes?

A. More than anything I want the students to learn strategies for how to think and how to solve problems rationally. If my students don't remember any of the chemistry but are able to gain those skills then I will still feel like I made a huge impact.

\mathbb{Q} . \langle What is your teaching philosophy?

A. I believe in trying to create an energetic and fun learning atmosphere where students are comfortable enough to be themselves but are still focused and engaged in the lesson. I also think it is important to set clear and high expectations for the students so that they feel motivated to live up to their potential.

The starburst on the cross is a sign of the Risen Christ. The gold-leafed apexes also represent the navigational points on a compass. When navigating the world with Christ as your compass your paths will be made straight. Trust in the LORD with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding, in all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make your paths straight. Proverbs 3:5-6

The steel of the cross is forged into rails and pins that reference the industrial history of Pittsburgh and the labor that built so many of our finest institutions and cultural heritage. The Mothers' Guild commissioned native Pittsburgh artist John Walters, of Iron Eden in Bloomfield, to create this very special cross and smaller replicas that are available for purchase.

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

In Memoriam

Ohn F. {Jack} Donahue July 28, 1924 - May 11, 2017 242

member of the Central Catholic Hall of Fame and a longtime supporter of Central Catholic, John F. (Jack) Donahue, '42, was an accomplished alumnus who lived a colorful, faithful and adventurous life as an entrepreneur, chief executive officer and philanthropist. Jack was raised in the Stanton Heights area and was a graduate of Saint Raphael's Elementary School before continuing his education at Central Catholic High School.

After his time at Central Catholic, Jack graduated from the United States Military Academy in 1946 and was a commissioned officer in the Army Air Corps. In 1955, he co-founded Federated Investors with fellow Central Catholic grads Richard B. Fisher, '41, and Thomas R. Donnelly, '43, and served as chairman emeritus until his death. 
