December 2020 - A Message from the Principal

### DEAR ALUMNI AND FRIENDS OF CENTRAL CATHOLIC,

I am sure those who graduated from Central Catholic can name Brothers, teachers, counselors, coaches, moderators and/or staff members who you remember fondly. Perhaps it was the interest they took in you as a

person, and their ability to bring out the best in you academically, athletically, or artistically. Maybe it was the way they lived their lives that became a model for your own.

Men and women come to Central Catholic not just to teach a subject, coach a sport, or receive a paycheck, but to make a difference in the lives of their students. They make many sacrifices because of that commitment and, despite those sacrifices, many stay for their entire careers.

In May, even as the 2019-20 school year was still underway, we began the process to reopen Central Catholic. As a community of Lasallian educators, we knew the importance of having as many students as possible with us face to face in the classroom. We saw a loss of connection and community that, despite our best efforts, happened during the spring. At the same, we recognized the dangers of COVID-19 and the risks it presents, especially to those who are older or have an underlying condition. As late spring turned into summer our plans took form. Teachers who had never taught in a hybrid model came in during the summer to adjust their curriculums and share best practices. Faculty stepped forward to provide professional development on a number of apps and technology tools that allowed our online learning to be even more effective. We collaborated together to develop new protocols and procedures to minimize the risk of COVID-19. This summer our teachers rose to the challenge and continue to do so.

In August, we welcomed or welcomed back almost 800 young men from over 50 different school districts. Most are physically back at Central, while others are fully online. Those at Central wear face masks, complete a daily health screening and get their temperature checked each morning.

Their lunch periods are socially distant with a plexiglass shield splitting the table. They are routinely reminded to wash their hands and if they are not feeling well, to stay home. Sports and extracurriculars have changed and our students know that a season could end at any time or possibly not begin. These changes were made to try and keep everyone as safe as possible while knowing the importance of being back at Central Catholic.

I hope you take some time to remember those men and women who made a difference in your time at Central. I assure you that the faculty and staff are dedicated to our ministry of Lasallian education and have gone to extraordinary lengths this year to continue our mission.

Enjoy this issue of *The Quadrangle* and know that you are always welcome for a visit at 4720 Fifth Avenue!

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

### **FOUR SENIORS NAMED NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP SEMIFINALISTS**

Liam Cringle, '21, Luke Crist, '21, Owen O'Malley, '21 and Liam Tinker, '21 are among approximately 16,000 Semifinalists in the 66th annual National Merit Scholarship Program. These academically talented high school seniors have an opportunity to continue in the competition for some 7,600 National Merit Scholarships worth more than \$30 million that will be offered next spring. To be considered for a Merit Scholarship® award, Semifinalists must fulfill several requirements to advance to the Finalist level of the competition. Over 90 percent of the Semifinalists are expected to attain Finalist standing, and more than half of the Finalists will win a National Merit Scholarship, earning the Merit Scholar® title.

NMSC, a not-for-profit organization that operates without government assistance, was established in 1955 specifically to conduct the annual National Merit Scholarship Program. Scholarships are underwritten by NMSC with its own funds and by approximately 400 business organizations and higher education institutions that share NMSC's goals of honoring the nation's scholastic champions and encouraging the pursuit of academic excellence.

### **SOPHOMORE EARNS FAITH-BASED BOY SCOUT MEDALS**

William Courtright, '23, earned the Pope Pius XII and Pillars of Faith medals, which normally would have been awarded by Biship Zubik in the St. Paul Cathedral in April, but were instead awarded at Boy Scouts of America Troop 90's meeting in September.

There are four Catholic religious medals that the church offers through the BSA, two in Cub Scouts (Light of Christ and Parvuli Dei), and two in Boy Scouts (Ad Altare Dei and Pope Pius XII). If a scout earns all four medals, which is rare, the Diocese awards him the Pillars of Faith medal.

William is one of only four scouts to receive the Pillars of Faith medal this year.





Will Koloc, '21, earned the highest possible ACT composite score of 36.

Fewer than half of 1 percent of students who take the ACT earn a top score. The ACT consists of tests in English, mathematics, reading and science, each scored on a scale of 1-36. A student's composite score is the average of the four test scores.





### ENGINEERING LABS ADD NEW 3D PRINTER TO THE LINEUP

The Central Catholic Computer Aided Design course added a new 3D printer to the fleet. This is our first Prusa printer and will allow for faster, more accurate prints. Justin Bell, '21, got inventive with the new printer and created one of our most complex student prints to date - a mini train engine.



### EAGLE SCOUT CREATES FOOD PANTRY AT LOCAL LIBRARY



## FOOTBALL CELEBRATES BACKTO-BACK WPIAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

On Friday, Nov. 6, 2020, the Vikings defeated rival North Allegheny 38-24 at Martorelli Stadium in the North Hills, claiming the WPIAL 6A Championship for the second year in a row. This WPIAL title was Central Catholic's fourth in six years.

Unfortunately, the Vikings season came to an end before they could advance to the PIAA quarterfinals against McDowell due to a move to fully online learning announced Nov. 13, 2020, which also included the immediate suspension of all athletics and extracurricular activities.

### A SCHOOL YEAR UNLIKE ANY OTHER REQUIRED PREPARATION UNLIKE ANY OTHER.

Throughout the summer, our faculty and staff diligently prepared for the reopening of Central Catholic. Teachers provided tech training to fellow faculty and staff on tools like Moodle, Screencast-o-matic, Turnitin, Zoom, Flip Grid, Remind, EdPuzzle and Socrative to ensure that our students could effectively learn no matter their location.



Although our day-to-day has changed, we have been able to pivot. The Lasallian approach to education of "meeting students where they are" allowed us to quickly adapt to meet the educational, emotional and spiritual needs of our students.

We started our year in a hybrid format to make sure that our policies and procedures worked and were understood. On Mondays and Thursdays, the "blue" group consisting of students with last names A-L came to Central Catholic in person, and on Tuesdays and Fridays, the "gold" group consisting of students with last names M-Z came for inperson learning.

Wednesdays were designated "pause days" to allow for additional deep cleaning within the building, as well as students to complete assignments, receive counseling or meet with their clubs and activities as a group via Zoom.

After five weeks in the hybrid format, we returned to a fully-in model on Monday, Oct. 5, 2020, where the majority of our students returned for in-person learning, while around 10% of our students chose to remain fully online. We continued periodic "pause days" to allow time for students to transition to the fully-in model.



Throughout every phase, each morning, our students are required to complete a health screening as well as get their temperature checked before entering the building. Classroom seating has been socially distanced to the best of our ability, and our faculty keeps detailed seating charts so that we can properly contact trace when we have a positive case.

Mask wearing is required at all times, except when dining in the McGinley Dining Hall. Throughout the McGinley Dining Hall, tables have been spaced out and plexiglass dividers were added for additional safety. The Performing Arts Center (PAC) has also been temporarily converted to a dining hall to provide additional space.

"Walking the Quad" has also been adapted for social distancing. Instead of walking the Quad after lunch, students now walk the football field to allow for space while walking. In the early fall, the Quad was used as an outdoor lunch and free period seating to give students a chance to get some fresh air and take a mask break.

Our dress code policy has been relaxed while students are required to wear masks, but we will return to our traditional shirt and tie dress code when students are no longer required to wear masks.



Throughout this entire process, the dedicated faculty and staff of Central Catholic have adapted to teach in-person, online and a combination of the two. In many classrooms, you will often find a classroom full of students attending in person, with a second set of students projected on the wall, tuning in via Zoom. Entire curriculums have been adapted to accommodate everyone so that students can remain on track.

Due to an uptick in cases in Allegheny County and at Central Catholic, along with the majority of other school districts within the area, we transitioned to fully online learning for all students starting Nov. 16, 2020 through Dec. 4, 2020. At the time of publication, students will transition back to hybrid learning for two weeks prior the two-week Christmas break.

### CENTRAL CATHOLIC BAND KEEPS THE MUSIC GOING DESPITE COVID-19

Each year around the end of July, you can count on the steady beat of the Central Catholic drumline practicing in the Quad to remind you that a new school year is just around the corner, and this year was no different.

Despite the threat of limited attendance at home games, a completely canceled fall athletics season or a potential move to online learning which means the cancellation of all in-person activities, the small but mighty Viking band, consisting of students from Central Catholic and Oakland Catholic, continued to practice in preparation for a season that may never come.

"FOR MANY OF THE BAND MEMBERS, PARTICIPATING IN THE GROUP IS ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT ACTIVITIES TO THEM DURING THEIR TIME IN HIGH SCHOOL," said Mr. Joe Wilson, Marching Band Director and Performing Arts Department Chair.

"HALTING BAND ACTIVITIES WOULD HAVE BEEN INCREDIBLY DETRIMENTAL TO THEIR HIGH SCHOOL EXPERIENCE, AS WELL AS DAMAGING TO THE CONTINUED DEVELOPMENT OF THE PROGRAM.

I SAW NO REASON WHY WE COULDN'T MODIFY OUR ACTIVITIES AND PROCEDURES UNDER THE CIRCUMSTANCES."

Before band camp even started, the band created a virtual recording of "Pomp and Circumstance" to be played during Central Catholic's socially distant graduation ceremony. In July, the band spent a reduced time of 20 hours practicing during summer band camp as well as during ninth period each day at the start of school perfecting their halftime show, "Music of Motown," in hopes of stepping on to the field to play for fans. Mr. Wilson adapted policies to make students as safe as possible while still being able to practice their instruments. All woodwind and brass players were only permitted to play their instruments outdoors and at a safe distance while doing so. While not playing, students were also required to wear their face masks at all time.

Despite never being able to attend a football game in person due to attendance limitations, the Viking band made the best of the season, supporting the football team by playing the fight song as they departed for their games.

After COVID-19 forced Hempfield to forfeit a game against the Vikings that would have been the Vikings' senior night, Central Catholic hosted its own football and band senior recognition on the practice field, where the band finally had the opportunity to play its half time show in full for a socially distant live audience consisting of senior parents and nearly 1,000 livestream viewers.

When another Viking band tradition, the Bloomfield Halloween parade, was canceled due to COVID-19 concerns, the Viking band didn't let that stop them. The band donned their costumes and gathered on the practice field to play Halloween classics such as "Thriller," and the Ghostbusters theme song.

Despite the challenges that will come with the cold winter season, Mr. Wilson is optimistic about the future of the Viking band for the remainder of the school year.

"THERE'S A CERTAIN SOLIDARITY IN COMING TOGETHER AS A GROUP TO MAKE THE BEST OF THINGS," said Mr. Wilson. "THE BAND NORMALLY MOVES FROM 'MARCHING BAND' TO 'CONCERT BAND' AFTER THE FOOTBALL SEASON, WITH INDOOR CONCERTS BEING THE NORM AT THAT POINT. I'M COMMITTED, THOUGH TO KEEPING UP WITH OUTDOOR PLAYING ONLY IF SAFETY DICTATES THAT IT'S THE BETTER CHOICE TO DO SO. I'M PROUD OF THE WILLINGNESS THEY'VE CONTINUED TO SHOW TO DO THEIR BEST."


### Virtual Alumni Speaker Series

Dr. Joseph S. Merola, '70

Dr. Merola provided a brief overview on how chemistry and chemistry-related fields are contributing to the understanding of viruses in general and COVID-19 in particular, including a glimpse into results from the Merola Research Group at Virginia Tech on compounds that may lead to a cure for COVID-19.



### **ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT**

### MEET EMMANUEL MATTHEWS, '08

Co-Lead Group Technical Program Manager, Artificial Intelligence Division Course Hero

### Q. TELL US ABOUT YOUR EXPERIENCE AT CENTRAL

A There is something really special about the group of friends that I made at Central. The people you surround yourself with early in life have a significant impact on how you develop. Central did a really interesting job of being able to balance a lot of things that young people really care about. You have really great athletics, but you are also surrounded by students who really care about actually getting an education, going to college and being successful academically.

### Q. HOW HAS COVID-19 AFFECTED YOUR WORK/CAREER?

A. The way I see COVID affecting work is a very positive thing in the context of the work that I do. I don't mean to diminish the severity of COVID, but in instances for people who have jobs who were able to somehow adapt to COVID, it is bringing about a positive change in that it is humanizing the work force in a way that I don't think we would have ever done this fast.

At the beginning of COVID, I had a coworker whose kid interrupted his Zoom call, and he apologized for it. I find it bizarre that we would have to apologize for parts of our lives. Who says you can't be professional and tend to a

child who happened to walk into a room? That's a weird paradigm that COVID course corrected. This is a part of every single person's life – why do we act and pretend like it doesn't exist? From that perspective, it is a very positive and humanizing change.

### Q. IN YOUR EYES, WHAT DOES THE FUTURE OF ONLINE EDUCATION LOOK LIKE?

A I don't think we can ever completely go back. Everyone is learning to adapt. Once you learn how to adapt, going back is difficult because it requires change again. Households are changing based on the fact that they have kids who need to learn. Internet companies and service providers are going to have to think differently about how they provide services for online learning from home. There are going to be so many different business models, concepts and ideas that are going to spawn from this. Once you start to figure out how to create that right type of bubble for yourself because those services exist, then I think it will be very difficult to go back – because the question will be "why?"

From a generational perspective, I hate online courses. It is not how I have learned to learn. In an environment where that is the norm, this won't be weird. In an environment when you grow up communicating through screens at the frequency that this next generation will be, learning through this medium is not weird, because they will likely build up adaptive ways to block stuff out to be able to focus in ways that I can't.

## Q. WE KNOW YOU ARE PASSIONATE ABOUT EQUITY, INCLUSION AND WORKING WITH UNDERREPRESENTED COMMUNITIES. TELL US ABOUT SOME OF YOUR WORK.

A I am an Advisory Board Member with Youth Impact Hub, a youth-focused social incubator that provides seed funding, support, training and resources for youth with ideas on how they can change the communities that they have grown up in that need help.

From a professional side, I always ask myself how I can make every company or team I am a part of a place where everyone has an equal chance to flourish. It takes a concerted effort for any organization to be able to create an environment where that is possible for every person equally in their group. We have to lead by example. As my career progressed and my sphere of influence increased, I felt an obligation to my community for me to do that because there are not many people who look like me in my industry. There is a level of personal responsibility that I feel for that and I take that very seriously.

I also use the platform that I am given to create change externally, using my company as a conduit. During my time at Google, I worked with over 3,000 students of all different backgrounds to show them that careers in technology are not always what they think. I am also on the U.S. delegation for AI standards, which is another way that I can use my platform to create a more fair and just society.

### Q. WHAT'S NEXT IN YOUR CAREER?

A I used to have these pre-conceived notions of needing to be an executive or director by 30, for example and I think a lot of us have these ideals of milestones that you are supposed to hit in a certain timeframe. I think I have realized the only thing that I can actually control is what I know and care about.

I always say, "what feeds my soul?" Every role I have ever had has technically been made up – literally they did not exist. We don't know what we don't know. When we try to do career mapping, we sometimes unintentionally put ourselves in a box because we say, "the only way I can do this thing is if I have this job with this title." The thing you actually care about is not the title, it's the task. You can likely get that in lots of different roles and industries, you just won't find them because that's not what you're explicitly looking for.

I understand what types of things I want to contribute to.
I want to continue to work on products and platforms
that do something meaningful. Those are really the only
things I use as my goal posts for my career. They allow
me to focus, push through tough times, and maintain high
performance in each job.

### Q. WHAT ADVICE WOULD YOU GIVE TO A CURRENT CENTRAL CATHOLIC STUDENT?

A If you have some pre-conceived notion about when you are supposed to have everything figured out, throw it away. There is no time that you will ever have it all figured out. I joke with my friends that life is a perpetual cycle of trying to get your life together. If I would have learned that earlier, it would have been a lot easier for me to roll with the punches.

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
## MEET DENNIS P. MCMANUS, '72

Government Affairs Director
Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank

### Q. TELL US ABOUT YOUR ROLE AT THE GREATER PITTSBURGH COMMUNITY FOOD BANK.

A. My position was created in recognition of the fact that government decisions at all levels have an impact on the supply of food available to distribute as well as the demand for that food. On the supply side, we work with government to get food and funds appropriations through the federal emergency food assistance program and state food purchase program. The state program enables food banks like ours to purchase most-needed items. Depending on donations from grocery stores and food processors, you don't have a lot of control over the items that you get. We also emphasize getting the healthiest types of food to people so it's not just empty calories. In recent years we have distributed significantly more produce, which tends to be expensive and also really desired by the people we serve.

Most of the people at the food bank are in the business of bringing food in and getting food out. In recent years, we have created a whole crew of people focused on maximizing the impact of government programs. We have people who help people facilitate applying for SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program). Our staff has helped over 1,500 people apply for SNAP benefits since March, which has resulted in about 1.5 million pounds of food.



In government affairs we work to make sure that programs are funded to the greatest extent possible. We also spend a lot of time pushing back against efforts to limit eligibility or cut benefit levels. Our efforts over the last several months during the COVID crisis has centered around getting waivers of certain requirements to make it easier on us for distribution and make sure food gets to people.

Q. THE GREATER PITTSBURGH COMMUNITY FOOD BANK HAS BECOME AN EVEN MORE CRITICAL RESOURCE DURING COVID-19. TELL US ABOUT SOME OF THE WAYS THE FOOD BANK HAS SUPPORTED PITTSBURGH DURING THIS DIFFICULT TIME.

A. The Food Bank had to do some quick adaptations when COVID came. We switched to "no touch" drive-up distributions to encourage social distancing. We have done 170 drive-up distributions as of November 30, serving 64,000 households, many of whom are

coming for food assistance for the very first time. Food insecurity tends to track very closely with employment and underemployment, and we are seeing that. The other change we have made is a switch to a program that we are calling Door Step Delivery. This is in recognition of the fact that under COVID conditions, there are a lot of people who simply can't leave their homes, so they can't participate in a drive-up distribution. 96% of our community partners (food pantries and soup kitchens) have remained operational during this period but people may have trouble getting to those sites. So, we started a program where we deliver food to peoples' homes and we have had over 14,000 people who have participated in that program. We have been trying to adapt to these changing circumstances and I think some of these new practices are going to outlive the pandemic.

## Q. HOW CAN PEOPLE GET INVOLVED WITH AND SUPPORT THE GREATER PITTSBURGH COMMUNITY FOOD BANK?

A Last year we had 6,000 people volunteer in some capacity. A lot of volunteers work in our sorting facility and we need people to fill those boxes. We rescue food from grocery stores and other food manufacturers and often times that comes to us in mixed form which means we need people to help sort the food. We also need people to help us with clerical activities and special events and advocating for public policy improvements.

## Q. AS AN ADJUNCT PROFESSOR AT THE UNIVERSITY OF PITTSBURGH, HOW HAS COVID-19 AFFECTED THE CLASSROOM FROM YOUR EXPERIENCE?

A. We do everything via Zoom. A disadvantage is that we have had to eliminate several "out of classroom" activities. One advantage it has is that at a glance, you can see all the students all the time. So, if you are losing somebody, you can call them out on it. When you are

in a classroom, even if you only have 18 people in front of you, it's hard to read who is getting what. Another advantage deals with guest speakers. In the past some people haven't been able to commit to coming to speak in-person because it becomes a three-hour project for a half-hour appearance. Now, you can just Zoom them in people in.

### Q. HOW DID YOUR EXPERIENCE AT CENTRAL CATHOLIC PREPARE YOU FOR YOUR CAREER?

A I recently had the opportunity to participate in a discussion about the future of the Central Catholic Forensics Society. There were speech and debate alumni ranging from the 1960's to 2015 on the call. Being part of that group has played an incredibly important part in my life and career. There is probably not a day that goes by that I don't find myself using some of the skills that I learned as a debater. Of all of the classes I took or the degrees I learned, I don't think any of that has been as influential in my life as the experience of debating for Central.

### Q. WHAT ADVICE WOULD YOU GIVE TO A CURRENT CENTRAL CATHOLIC STUDENT?

A. Try Forensics Society as an extracurricular activity!

They will be carrying on a legacy of excellence, learning valuable skills and making friends. They should do all that they can to uphold the reputation of the school and continue to stay involved in promoting and supporting Central financially and otherwise.

AUG. 24, 1946 - JUNE 26, 2020




## Dr. Robert E. Lee, '48

OCT. 3, 1932 - AUG. 25, 2020




## Reverend John O'Malley, '54



## Terrell Pollard, '20



Terrell was passionate about cooking and was admitted to his dream school, the Culinary Institute of America.






