Applications for the Fall of 2023 are now being considered. The deadline to submit your complete application is **January 31, 2023, 2:45 pm.**

Decisions on acceptance of new students into the Scholars Program are made by the Program Directors in consultation with teachers, counselors, academic deans, and the principal. Students will be notified of their acceptance in March.

All parts of your application should be submitted in <u>one</u> packet (all together). Incomplete applications will not be considered.

The following additional items will be submitted separately:

Request 2 teacher recommendations then follow-up with them to make sure these
are submitted directly to the Program Directors by January 31, 2023. Please give
your teachers the courtesy of plenty of notice to write your recommendations.
Teachers do not have to comply with last-minute asks.

____ The Program Directors will obtain a copy of every applicant's transcript/most recent progress reports directly from the Guidance Office.

Once your application, transcript and teacher recommendations have been reviewed, eligible applicants will be notified about scheduling interviews in February. The interviews will generally last about 15 minutes.

PART 3 – SHORT ESSAY PROMPTS

Please answer the following questions in a paragraph or two each (about 250 words). Please type your answers on a separate sheet with your name at the top. These essays will give us a vivid sense of who you are and what passion, focus, and innovation you might bring to the Scholars Program. Draw on your best qualities as a writer and thinker. Take some risks and have fun. Proofread carefully.

- 1.) The Scholars Program has a longstanding commitment to scholarship, citizenship, and discipleship. Tell us how your story intersects (or will intersect) with these values.
- 2.) Should a just society seek to promote the virtue of its citizens, or should societal laws remain neutral toward competing conceptions of the good?
- 3.) In 2015, the city of Melbourne, Australia created a "tree-mail" service, in which all of the trees in the city received an email address so that residents could report any tree-related issues. As an unexpected result, people began to email their favorite trees sweet and occasionally humorous letters. Imagine this has been

- expanded to any object (tree or otherwise) in the world and share with us the letter you'd send to your favorite. -inspired by Hannah Lu, Class of 2020 at U. of Chicago
- 4.) Many of this century's problems will require interdisciplinary solutions (the combination of two or more academic disciplines). Identify an important problem and describe an interdisciplinary approach to solving that problem.
- 5.) How have the environments or experiences of your upbringing -- your home, neighborhood, or community -- shaped the person you are today?

PART 4 – 500 WORDS OR LESS ESSAY PROMPT

Please respond in 500 words or less (12 pt. font, double-spaced on a paper with one-inch margins). This essay will be submitted for blind review to the advisory council.

Using one or several of the following questions, develop and defend a thesis claim: How do you think the two quotes relate? Which perspective most accurately describes the world? What type of consequences do you see for each position?
