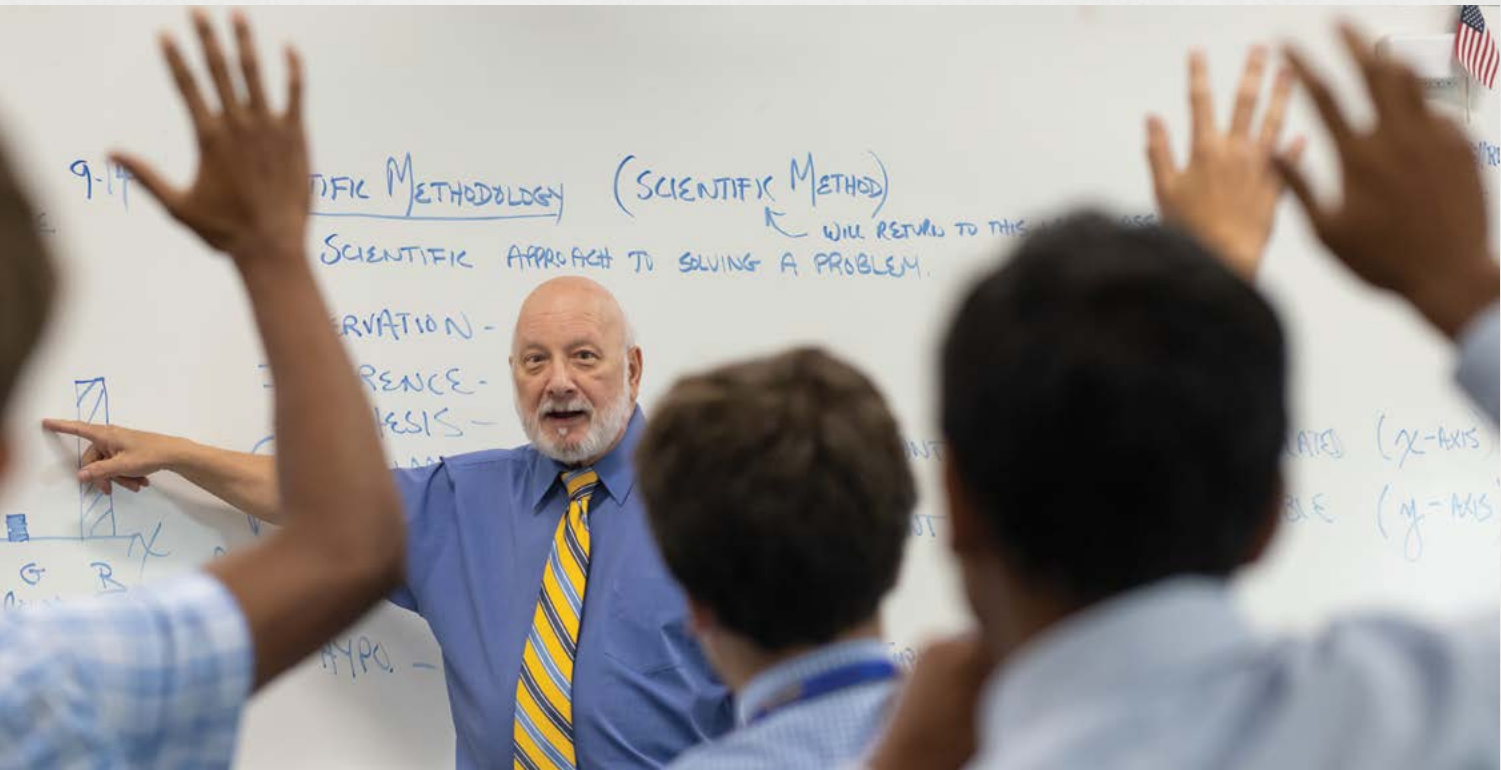

STUDENT SPOTLIGHT

CENTRAL CATHOLIC FORENSICS WINS 2ND CONSECUTIVE STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

Ending the last season with a state championship, a nationals semifinalist, and countless local victories — perhaps our best competitive season ever — we knew we had expectations to live up to, so work began early. As always, the year's first tournament is M&M Behrend in Erie. With numerous top 6 placements and Amari Smith in first, we secured a second-team victory at the tournament, setting the tone for the rest of the year.

AMARI SMITH, '23, BREAKS
CENTRAL CATHOLIC'S ALL-TIME
FORENSICS RECORDS

Amari Smith, '23, is a once-in-a-generation competitor. In his four years of speech competition, Amari has accumulated 2,205 overall points (at the time of this publication's release) and numerous accolades at major tournaments across the country. Throughout his high school career, Smith was able to achieve the most points in Central Catholic history! The previous record was set by Will McCarthy, '16, who previously held the record with a score of 1,685.

Since his sophomore year, Amari has always double, triple, or even quadruple-entered every weekend. Most students choose to perfect just one event, on average doing about 4 rounds per tournament. For comparison, at the Pennsbury Falcon Invitational, Amari competed in 23 rounds.

Just this year, Amari proved that he is a competitive powerhouse by placing in the final round of 4 events at the Pennsbury Falcon Invitational and placed first in two events at the Upper St. Clair Three Rivers Invitational. At this year's highly prestigious Tournament of Champions, he took 2nd place in his primary event. **CONGRATULATIONS, AMARI!**

After some local tournaments, the team traveled to La Salle College High School in Wyndmoor. With Jack Sabo, '23, and Amari Smith, '23, in first place and Santino Balistrieri, '26, and the team of Michael Brienza, '24 & Michael Murphy, '24, in second place, we took third place as a team.

After Christmas came the Dalmasse Sterner Steel City Invitational, hosted by Central Catholic. With over 40 alumni returning and parents helping out, we expanded and had one of the best competitive local tournaments this season. Santino, Amari, Aidan Nicholas, '23, and Matthew Evans, '25, coming in first, our team took second in Speech, making our alumni and parents proud.

The conclusion of our tournament meant that the primary season had truly begun. Local tournaments grew in size, and our team began hunting for coveted Tournament of Champions bids: only given out at large national tournaments across the country. For our varsity, that meant competing in two different tournaments almost every weekend, one in-person and one

virtually. At the St. Genesius Invitational (held virtually in Atlanta), Aidan and Amari took first place against national competitors. The conclusion of our tournament meant that the main season had truly begun.

We brought a smaller portion of our team to our second major travel tournament: Pennsbury in Fairless Hills. Amari, quadruple-entered, acted as a one-man army. He made it to the final round in all four events and won one. Aidan also took first in his event, granting us the second-place trophy in Speech.

Soon after, national qualifiers were upon us. At CFL (Catholic Forensics League) Qualifiers, our team qualified ten students to compete at the national tournament in Louisville, KY, in late May. At the National Speech and Debate Association (NSDA) Qualifiers, Central Catholic qualified six students to compete in Phoenix, AZ, in June, the most out of any school in Western Pennsylvania, and won 1st place in Speech as a team. Building on this momentum, Central Catholic landed in Bloomsburg, PA for the State Championship tournament, hungry for another win.

Our team knew exactly what to do this year to secure another victory: give it all on Day 1 to ensure the most points. We were prepared with students strategically placed in the largest events to gather the most points. At the end of the first day, our team had two students in first, two in second, and two in fourth. We did not know it yet, but we had already won the tournament based on the first day's points. On the second day, our students competed in elimination rounds for their own success. Four students made it to the final round. When the dust settled, Amari Smith, Aidan Nicholas, and Luka DePasquale, '24, (a two-time champion) won their events, with Jack Sabo, '23 finishing as a runner-up.

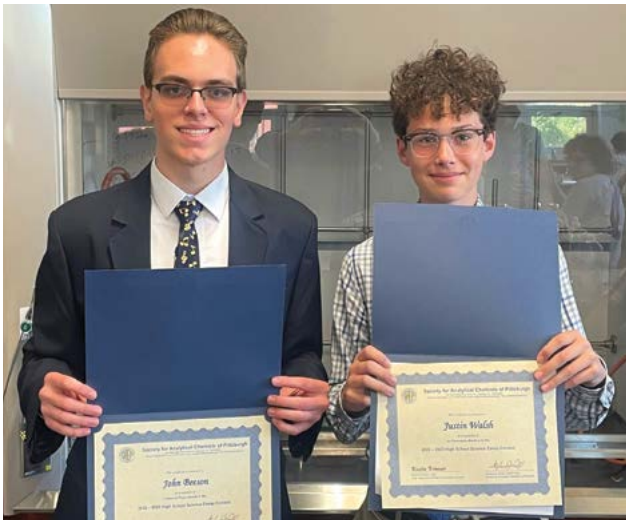


VOLUNTEERING FOR A GOOD CAUSE

Black Student Union Makes Historic Visit to the Executive Office

2023 marks the first time current students visited The White House in Central Catholic's 96-year history! It stemmed from an invitation by Dr. Ron Layton, '83, a long-time United States Secret Service agent and Deputy Assistant Director who dedicated a large part of his career to keeping our country's leaders safe while protecting our homeland.

His vision of inviting Central's Black Student Union to witness our democracy at the highest level, came to fruition in March. During the tour, students viewed the Blue Room's striking beauty and artwork, the alluring appearance and antique furniture of the Red Room, and the East Room, where the President of the United States hosts foreign leaders for State Dinners. Our students were thoroughly impressed and in awe while touring this magnificent structure which has been standing since 1800.

To round out the experience, students and chaperones visited Arlington National Cemetery and the National Museum of African American and Culture.



A PERSONAL NOTE FROM DR. RON LAYTON, '83

"This trip was intended to provide significant long-term value for Central Catholic. I wanted to engage the students in the area of leadership development while simultaneously exposing them to an environment that very few Americans will experience.

When I think about how to develop young people, my personal motto is: **"YOU WANT TO BE WHAT YOU SEE,"** and I wanted our young men to see one of the iconic symbols of our great nation and the multitude of servant leaders who keep us safe by their commitment to duty.

The 'eloquence of example' is one of the best ways to mold young leaders and this trip provided numerous first-hand examples. It was a special treat to have the United States Secret Service Deputy Director, Faron Paramore provide our students with a personal White House escort while sharing stories about his unique journey across an illustrious career of service and sacrifice.

ONE OF THE THINGS THAT CENTRAL DOES IS BUILD LEADERS THROUGH LASALLIAN VALUES.

The message to the students was simple:

LEADERS ARE REGULAR PEOPLE WHO CHOOSE TO DO SPECIAL THINGS. LEADERSHIP ISN'T FREE; YOU PAY FOR IT WITH THE CURRENCY OF YOUR BEHAVIOR THROUGH SERVICE AND SACRIFICE.

I retired from the Secret Service in 2018 as the Deputy Assistant Director, and much like Central, I've gotten more from these institutions than I was able to give. The White House trip was a small effort to make a big impression on some of our young students. This was a total team effort. I want to personally thank Brother Mike Andrejko, FSC, '86, Mrs. Brandy Gershon, Mr. Brian A. Cook Sr., '98, Mr. Matthew Stoessel, '95, Mr. Brandon Haburjak, '06, and Deacon Mike Fekete, '87, as I could not have done this without them. I suspect that as time passes, everyone in attendance will fully appreciate our history-making event and the lessons derived from our unique experience."

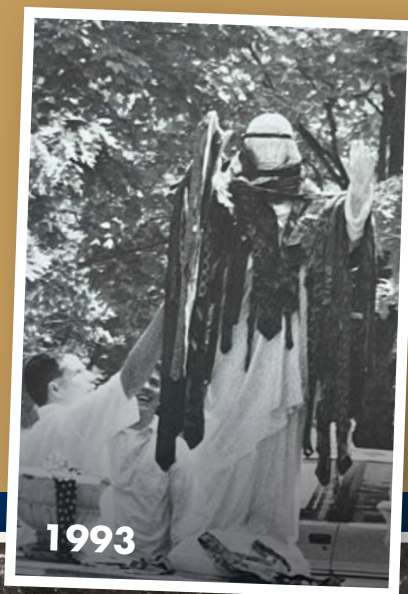

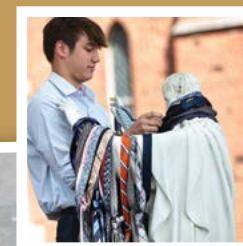
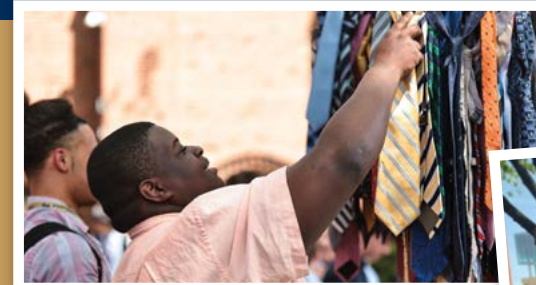

The tone was set by Coach Brian Urso the moment he set foot onto Central Catholic's campus in 2019! Determination, success, and the will to win was the [unspoken] mantra, and building a basketball program that exudes success, was only a matter of time!

THAT TIME ARRIVED FASTER THAN HE IMAGINED!

In only his fourth year as head coach, Urso led the varsity basketball team to bring home one of the most coveted awards in our region, the WPIAL 6A Championship! However, winning is never the story. IT'S THE JOURNEY!

"IT'S NEAT TO SEE WHERE THE PROGRAM HAS GONE FROM DAY ONE. WALKING INTO 4720 [FIFTH AVENUE] – ALMOST 4 YEARS TO THE DAY OF BEING HIRED – WITH A BIT OF UNCERTAINTY, GETTING A FEEL FOR THE SCHOOL, THE GYM, AND MOST IMPORTANTLY, A FEEL FOR THE GUYS THAT I AM TO COACH," said Urso.

"IT WAS SURREAL FOR ME BECAUSE CENTRAL CATHOLIC IS LEGENDARY, AND THERE IS A STANDARD. THERE ARE HIGH EXPECTATIONS, AND I WANTED TO LIVE UP TO THAT."



Assistant Coach Kyle Goldcamp, '04, has been an integral part of the team's success. His skills and knowledge of the game, having played professionally, has been a prodigious asset to the coaching staff. With both Urso and Goldcamp coaching in tandem, the Vikings made it to the postseason every year. However, they came up short in the 2022 semifinals against Fox Chapel, coached by Central Alumus Zachary Skrinjar, '97, who applauded Central being well coached. Skrinjar saw great potential in his alma mater even predicting a Vikings championship the following year, despite the rivalry. "DURING THE POSTGAME HANDSHAKE," Urso said, "SKRINJAR SAID TO ME, 'THIS WILL BE YOU NEXT YEAR!'"

"I TOOK THAT TO HEART," Urso said.

Knowing that his team was on the cusp of reaching the pinnacle, Urso said, "WHEN I TOOK THE JOB, THE FIRST THING I ASKED JOEY DAVID, CURRENT HEAD COACH AT MOUNT LEBANON, 'WHAT CAN I DO DIFFERENTLY TO GET OVER THAT HUMP? HE REPLIED, ENHANCE SKILLS. FOCUS ON FUNDAMENTALS. AND WHEN IT COMES TO THE [OVERALL] SPORT, TEACH! TEACH! TEACH!'"

THE PREPARATION FROM ON-COURT ACTIVITIES CONTINUED TO EXPAND TO EXTENSIVE OFF-COURT TEAM-BUILDING EXERCISES, COUPLED WITH MORE TEAM DINNERS AND PRAYER.

The 2022-23 season was monumental on many levels as the sweat equity gained to this point was made from a team who jelled for four years as a cohesive unit.

"I REMEMBER MY DAYS OF BEING A FRESHMAN IN 2019. I'M PLAYING ON A BIGGER STAGE, THE CHANGE OF PACE, THE SIZE OF THE PLAYERS. EVERYTHING IS FASTER," said Dante DePante, '23 (Guard, #11). "FROM DAY ONE, WE WERE TOLD THAT OUR GOAL WAS TO HAVE A WINNING ATTITUDE IN BASKETBALL AND IN ACADEMICS. THE WHOLE TIME, WE WERE BEING TRAINED FOR LIFE LESSONS!"

The benefits of their labor took Central Catholic to the WPIAL Championship game at the Petersen Event Center against New Castle, to whom they lost in regular season play. "I KNEW THEY WOULD BE TOUGH, BUT WE WERE UP FOR THE CHALLENGE," said Coach Urso.

The Vikings held the lead for the first half but allowed New Castle to narrow the advantage slightly in the 3rd quarter. Ultimately, Central Catholic was victorious 61-52, and the culmination of hard work was enjoyed at that moment!

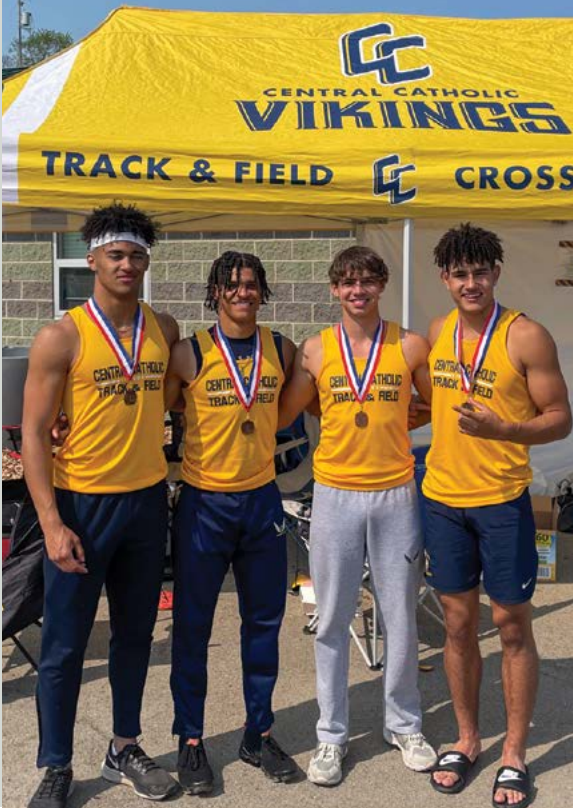

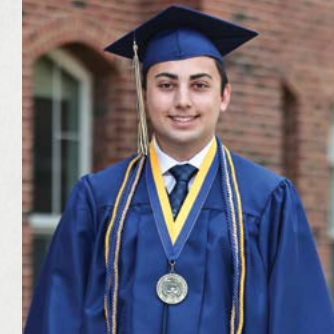

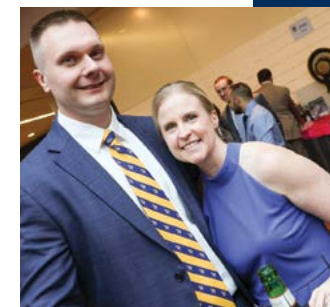
Q. DO YOU HAVE ANY ADVICE FOR FUTURE STUDENTS?

Terry Totten, '76 Etched into Central Catholic's History Books

HIS OFFICIAL CENTRAL CATHOLIC JOURNEY STARTED IN 1972 AS A FRESHMAN HAILING FROM POINT BREEZE.

His unofficial entry began as a ball boy in the eighth grade while working with the Central Catholic football team.

In his early years, Terry Totten, '76, started cutting his teeth and learning how significant Central Catholic football was in Pittsburgh. He also began to see firsthand that the spirit of brotherhood among the players and the entire school community was extraordinary. It quickly became apparent that humility and loyalty were a direct path to success.

LITTLE DID HE KNOW THAT OVER 50 YEARS LATER, HE WOULD BE AMONG THE SCHOOL'S MOST LEGENDARY FIGURES.

"I really looked up to those guys and was excited to enroll at Central.

Obviously, like every other young man who walks through these doors, my life was changed," said Totten.

"That's a credit to the teachers I had, my coaches, and especially the Christian Brothers. The time, energy, and love they put into our school, sometimes at their own expense, was just incredible."

Thanks to his Central Catholic education and its longstanding tradition of service, Totten knew at an early age that he wanted to give back to young people.

Upon returning to Central Catholic in 2002, he served as defensive coordinator, where he was an integral part of two Western Pennsylvania Interscholastic League (WPIAL) titles and a Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association (PIAA) State Championship.

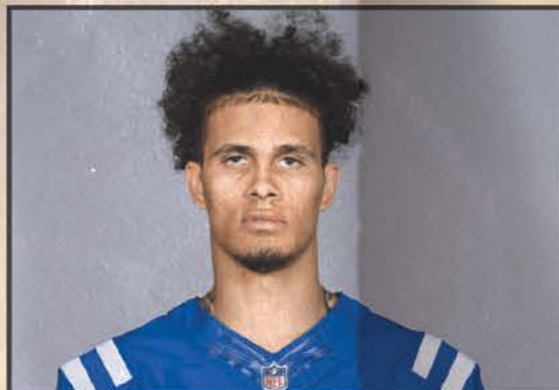

Damar Hamlin

Damar Hamlin, '16, a highly respected alumnus who has been an integral part of our Lasallian Community, sustained a serious injury that brought the world together. Hamlin, a rising NFL defensive back with the Buffalo Bills, suffered cardiac arrest during Monday Night Football on January 2, against the Cincinnati Bengals, after what appeared to be a routine

tackle. After being hospitalized in intensive care for several days from the potentially life-threatening hit, his resilience showed through; and his ability to show strength, both physically and spiritually, was apparent.

Hamlin's last memory was playing on the field moments before the hit. When he woke up several days after being heavily sedated,

Hamlin asked:
"WHO WON THE GAME?"

Doctors responded,
**"YOU DID.
YOU WON THE GAME
OF LIFE!"**

The Central Catholic Community lifted him up in prayer, held a vigil, and dedicated a home varsity basketball game to him. Most importantly, it was through the grace of God that his recovery was not only successful...but exceptional!

Hamlin continues to give back to Central by speaking with participants of the football summer camps and during the football program's summer conditioning.
