

# TO THE CENTRAL CATHOLIC HIGH SCHOOL COMMUNITY,

We welcome this opportunity to share the exciting news at our beloved Central Catholic High School, from student accomplishments to transitions in our administration's leadership and Alumni milestones. As we close the first half of the 2023–24 academic year, we hope you enjoy this edition of *The Quadrangle*.

First, a President-Principal model of school governance has been re-implemented to enhance the school's overall operations and ability to meet the opportunities and challenges associated with education in the present day.

At the end of last school year, our principal, Brother Michael Andrejko, FSC, '86, embarked on a sabbatical. In conjunction with this, the Board of Directors adjusted the leadership structure of Central Catholic to spread the responsibilities of leading the largest Catholic school in the Diocese of Pittsburgh beyond one person.

The school moved to an interim President-Principal leadership structure in June of 2023. Matthew J. Stoessel, '95, who had been serving as Executive Director of Advancement, was appointed as Interim-President. Kevin Sheridan, who had been serving as Assistant

Principal of Faculty and Curriculum Development, was appointed as Interim Principal. The Board's next action was to launch a search for a new President. After a six-month search, the Diocese of Pittsburgh and the school's Board of Directors were pleased to announce, on November 1, 2023, the appointment of Matthew J. Stoessel, '95 to President. With a rich background in non-profit leadership, a steadfast commitment to our school's Catholic and Lasallian values, and a vision for Central Catholic's future, Stoessel is poised to lead our school into its next one hundred years.

The school is grateful for Kevin Sheridan's academic leadership with the support of fellow Assistant Principals Karen Kolenik and James Donahue, '03. This team of educators has done an amazing job in service to Central Catholic during this time of transition. The Board would like to acknowledge the invaluable contributions of Brother Michael Andrejko, FSC, '86, to the Central Catholic community. We are excited to share that he will return to Central as Vice President of Lasallian Mission. His role will officially commence at the beginning of the 2024-25 academic year.



Central Catholic is truly blessed to have the presence of the De LaSalle Christian Brothers since 1927. It is critical for the school to have Br. Michael serve in his new role and be an integral part of molding our students, faculty, and staff in the Lasallian charism. The Board is grateful to Mr. Sheridan, Mrs. Kolenik, and Mr. Donahue for

their dedication in serving as interim leaders until the end of the 2023-24 academic year. The Board intends to initiate a nationwide search for the next Principal, commencing in early 2024. The goal is to have the new Principal of Central Catholic assume their position on July 1, 2024.

WE INVITE YOU TO JOIN US IN SUPPORTING THE EXCITING FUTURE AHEAD. TOGETHER, WE CAN BUILD ON THE BROTHERHOOD AND SERVICE THAT DEFINES THE LEGACY OF OUR SCHOOL WHILE ENSURING THAT OUR STUDENTS CONTINUE TO THRIVE ACADEMICALLY, PERSONALLY, AND SPIRITUALLY.





# MATTHEW J. STOESSEL, '95, A PROUD ALUMNUS OF CENTRAL CATHOLIC HIGH SCHOOL, HAS BEEN NAMED THE SCHOOL'S NEXT PRESIDENT.

THE APPOINTMENT IS A HISTORIC MOMENT IN CENTRAL CATHOLIC'S NEARLY ONE HUNDRED YEARS.

Following a search led by Central Catholic's Board of Directors and the Diocese of Pittsburgh's Secretariat for Education, under the leadership of Superintendent of Catholic Schools Michelle Peduto, the Board voted unanimously in favor of appointing Stoessel to the position. The Most Reverend David A. Zubik, Bishop of Pittsburgh, and the board of the Catholic High Schools of the Diocese of Pittsburgh made the official decision, with a start date of November 1, 2023.

IN STOESSEL'S OFFICIAL APPOINTMENT LETTER, BISHOP ZUBIK REMARKED,

"MATT WILL CONTINUE TO BUILD UPON THE FINE TRADITION OF EXCELLENCE THAT HAS ALWAYS BEEN A HALLMARK AT CENTRAL CATHOLIC HIGH SCHOOL." BISHOP ZUBIK CONTINUED, "I KNOW THAT MATT UNDERSTANDS THE IMPORTANCE OF FORMING YOUNG MEN IN THE FAITH AND GUIDING THEM TO EXCEL IN SERVICE AND LEADERSHIP."

The process of searching for a President commenced this past spring when a message was sent to parents and guardians about changes to the school's leadership structure. It read in part, "Central Catholic High School will return to the President-Principal model to enhance the efficiency of the school's operations. Central Catholic is now in line with most other schools within the Diocese of Pittsburgh that follow this administration format."

"WITHOUT HESITATION. THE CENTRAL CATHOLIC BOARD OF DIRECTORS VOTED UNANIMOUSLY IN FAVOR BECAUSE WE BELIEVE MATT IS FULLY COMMITTED TO THE **CENTRAL CATHOLIC'S SUCCESS** AND IS DETERMINED TO LEAD US INTO OUR 100TH YEAR AND BEYOND,"

SAYS JOHN STALEY V, '84, CHAIRMAN OF THE CENTRAL CATHOLIC BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

The President's primary purpose is to provide institutional leadership of the school to achieve the fullest attainment of Central Catholic's mission statement. The President bears responsibility for the school's operation and policies, concentrating primarily on its Catholic and Lasallian identity. In his role, Stoessel is responsible for ensuring sound fiscal management and the school's longterm financial stability through direct oversight of the business operations, facilities, fundraising/ development, marketing, alumni and community relations, student recruitment, and enrollment management activities.

Returning to a President-Principal model is designed to streamline dayto-day operations and enhance connections with alumni, stakeholders, and partners.

The school's first president was Brother Richard Grzeskiewicz, FSC, '62, who passed away in 2012.




Brother Robert Schaefer, FSC, a former faculty member who also served as Principal of Central Catholic from 2009-2016, had the following remarks from his written message to the Bishop of Pittsburgh:

Stoessel, who holds a Bachelor of Science in Education and a Master of Arts in Strategic Communication from Seton Hall University, has served as Executive Director of Advancement. Since 2017, he oversaw the school's annual fundraising/development efforts and alumni programs. Under Stoessel's leadership, the school has consistently achieved record yearly fundraising results, established creative strategies to meet current challenges, and prepared for the future while being deeply committed to the students, alumni, and the Central Catholic community.

Matt was raised and resides in the South Hills area of Pittsburgh with his wife, Clarinda, and their three children: Victoria, William, and John. Before attending Central Catholic, he attended St. Thomas More Catholic School (now Ave Maria Academy) in Bethel Park, PA. Matt's children attended Ave Maria Academy in Bethel Park from Pre-K through the 8th grade. Matt and Clarinda's daughter, Victoria, recently graduated from Oakland Catholic High School as a member of the class of 2023. She received a full scholarship to attend The Conway School of Nursing at The Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. Stoessel's sons, William and John, are a junior and freshman respectively, at Central Catholic.



# NEW TRADITION OF ENGINEERING BEGINS AT CENTRAL CATHOLIC


YEARS OF PLANNING BROUGHT THE VISION TO FRUITION.

Through the program, guest speakers were brought to campus and field trips were organized to introduce students to the various engineering disciplines.


Central Catholic's Engineering Institute checks all of the boxes to allow students to learn and explore engineering at a high level.





### **H2O2 EXPERIMENT**

A demonstration of the decomposition of hydrogen peroxide was presented by Brother Eric's Chemistry II students. The procedure involved combining detergent and potassium iodide and adding a peroxide solution to a graduated cylinder. The hydrogen peroxide decomposed, producing water and foam in the form of oxygen gas. This experiment triggered an exothermic reaction, and the temperature of the foam was measured using thermometers.



# LAB EXPLORATION

Mark Krotec's AP Biology and Bioengineering classes visited Carnegie Mellon University's Biomedical Engineering Teaching Lab to engage in a stem cell laboratory experience! Students took part in an experiment designed to examine the effects of either an anti-inflammation drug or alcohol on the replication rate and differentiation behavior of myoblastic stem cells. In addition, they were able to test the cell seeding efficacy of a poly-lactic acid scaffold material.



# **SCHOLARS TRAVEL THE LAND**

Annually, the seniors in The David S. Baginski, FSC Scholars Program take a break from one of the busiest semesters of their high school career to enjoy a day of fellowship and fun as a class. This year, they traveled to Cleveland, where they toured the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame and the Cleveland Art Museum. During their travels, the students and chaperones enjoyed a very special family-style Lebanese lunch in the city's historic center.

# FINANCIAL AND SPIRITUAL GROWTH

John Rudzik, '55, returned to Central Catholic in November and shared his expertise and experience as the chief financial officer of the industrial roofing company Centimark Corporation with health classes on campus.

As a product of Catholic education (Holy Rosary Elementary, Central Catholic High School, and Duquesne University, respectfully),



# STEM OUTREACH PROGRAM

Mark Krotec, '73, Central Catholic biology and bioengineering science teacher, established two programs to enhance STEM education throughout the Diocese of Pittsburgh. Since 1995, Krotec has directed a teacher scholarship program, which funds K-12 educators to attend the National Science Teachers Association's (NSTA) yearly convention. Roughly 90 teachers have been funded, with over \$150,000 donated by Central Catholic Alumni. These teachers and Krotec have been tasked with sharing their newly gained teaching strategies and resources at summer workshops held yearly at CCHS. The Diocese of Pittsburgh, in turn, has supported teacher workshop attendees with equipment grants.



A second program was initiated in 2016, wherein Krotec and a group of student ambassadors traveled to Diocesan grade schools to engage classes in advanced science experiments. Schools have a variety of science topics o choose from, including Enzymology, Environmental Science, Regenerative Medicine, DNA Technology, Bioengineering, and Invertebrate Behavior.



# "Tradition never graduates"

is a phrase often expressed at Central Catholic High School, exemplifying alumni's enduring love and appreciation for their rich upbringing. Dating back to the school's founding in 1927, before the prevalence of school buses and the regularity of carpooling, students would journey to school by any means, embarking on their quest for knowledge at what was originally known as Central District Catholic High School.

"WHEN I WAS A STUDENT IN THE 1950S, 98 PERCENT OF US ARRIVED AT SCHOOL ON FOOT, BY STREETCAR OR BUS. MOST OF US HAD TO LIVE CLOSE TO SCHOOL," said Br. Martin Zewe, FSC, '59. "BACK THEN, THERE WAS NO BUSING BY SCHOOL DISTRICTS. YOU HAD TO GET A PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION BUS PASS THAT WAS 50 CENTS PER WEEK THAT ONLY INCLUDED THE GENERAL PITTSBURGH AREA."

Over the years, Central Catholic began attracting students from all over the Pittsburgh region. "WHAT MAKES CENTRAL CATHOLIC SO UNIQUE IS THAT THE DEMOGRAPHICS OF PITTSBURGH AND THE REGION HAVE CHANGED OVER THE DECADES, AND SO HAVE THE DEMOGRAPHICS OF OUR STUDENT BODY," said Andrew Macurak, Executive Director of Enrollment Management.

"AS THE POPULATION HAS SHIFTED FROM THE CITY NEIGHBORHOODS AROUND OAKLAND TO THE SUBURBS OVER THE LAST 90-PLUS YEARS, CENTRAL CATHOLIC HAS SEEN THE SAME SHIFT WITH A STUDENT BODY COMPRISED OF STUDENTS FROM FIFTY-SEVEN DIFFERENT SCHOOL DISTRICTS."

The diverse composition of students shapes the school's exceptional educational environment and continuously aims to explore how Central's student body complements its distinctive social milieu.

Central Catholic High School has a student body distinguished by a blend of cross-cultural pupils and a group of young individuals who embody the essence of what it means to be part of the school's fabric.


Students attending from six counties in the Greater Pittsburgh area make Central Catholic the region's most diverse cultural and socioeconomic high school, fostering a vibrant and dynamic learning environment...

Central Catholic has long been recognized for its outstanding education, close-knit community, and commitment to instilling core Catholic and Lasallian principles in its students. However, the number of students coming from Catholic feeder schools has recently decreased, which has presented challenges. Central's real strength, however, lies in its student body's resilience, adaptability, and potential.

The closures and mergers of Diocesan elementary schools are no secret, especially for those within the City of Pittsburgh. Longtime feeder schools like St. Rosalia's in Greenfield and St. Raphael's in Morningside sent generations of students to Central Catholic are no longer open. The largest elementary schools in the Diocese are at a considerable distance from Central, with many of their families residing in school districts that do not provide transportation to Central. The declining number of students is not just a Diocesan problem. The Pittsburgh Public School district has seen a consistent drop in its enrollment over the last few years. The population has certainly shifted further away from the center of Pittsburgh, forcing Central Catholic to get creative with transportation and parking.
